### **HISTORY OF THE SOCIETY**

In 1985, a meeting was called in Barham to form a committee to update the book "The History of Barham", written by T.R. McConnell and published in 1951.

Originally titled the Barham Historical Research Group, under the first president, Jack Keck, the group had several homes in Barham – in private houses, at the Bowling Club and upstairs at the School of Arts Hall.

Committee members Evelyn McConnell and Olwyn Alexander spent countless hours poring over copies of old district newspapers at the Kerang Library to gather material for the early BORDER JOURNALs. Local typists assisted with the early stencils and the Barham High School assisted with printing.

Then, in 1995, the Myall School building (which had been closed under the State Government re-shuffle) was purchased by the Kerang Shire, donated to the group and relocated to an empty block, owned by, and next to the Koondrook Baptist Church. This became our new home and the group's name was changed to the title we use today.

In 2003, the land we occupied in Punt Road became superfluous to the needs of the Baptist Church and was purchased by Stan Roberts and family and donated to the Society. The gift covered both the land and the Church building itself, which was in a poor state of repair. We are currently seeking funding to carry out the required renovations.
